Meetings have already been held in Canyonville, Sutherlin, Riddle, and Yoncalla.

Timber receipts from harvests on Federal land were once the County's largest source of revenue, and are part of most services you receive, including Public Safety, Veterans, Public Health and Senior Services. The Federal Safety Net (Secure Rural Schools Program), replaced revenues from actual timber harvests beginning in 2000. On October 1, 2015, the Secure Rural Schools Program (Federal Safety Net) expired. Since then, Douglas County has been operating on reserves and actual timber receipts that have dramatically declined. Even though county spending has been reduced each year, the county has had to use reserve funds to maintain critical services. The reserve funds are declining rapidly.

Douglas County Government employs approximately 800 full- and part-time employees in a wide variety of jobs. The Board of Commissioners, consisting of three full-time members, is the county's governing body. They provide a direct link between the citizens of Douglas County and their county government. The Board of Commissioners is responsible for: approving ordinances (county laws); adopting the county budget; setting standards for the use of county property; appointing non-elected officials to boards, commissions, and committees; and oversees all operations of the county.

Regular Board meetings are scheduled for each Wednesday at 9:00 a.m. in Room 216 of the County Courthouse. Department head work sessions are held every Monday and Friday in room 219 of the County Courthouse, unless otherwise posted.

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
